





The **COVID-19 pandemic** came to Aotearoa New Zealand in 2020.



**COVID-19** is a type of virus that makes people sick.



A **pandemic** is when many people around the world get the same sickness at the same time.

# What is the Royal Commission?




The Royal Commission is a group of people who learned about things that happened during the COVID-19 pandemic.






held nearly 4 hundred meetings





 met with nearly 2 hundred and 50 organisations





 received nearly 13 thousand public **submissions**.





**Evidence** is facts about something that happened.

Here a **submission** is a kind of report someone writes so another person can use the information in it.



The Royal Commission spoke to people who made important decisions during the pandemic like former Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern.





The Royal Commission spoke to:

- government agencies
- healthcare providers
- businesses.



The Royal Commission read important things written about the pandemic like:




- research papers
- documents put out by the Government.



The Royal Commission looked at:

 how the Government was ready for the pandemic





 how different things were done like:

Lockdowns were when the
Government asked everyone to stay
at home so that they would not get
sick or spread the virus.



#### **Borders** are where people:

- come into the country
- leave the country.



When the border was closed during the pandemic there were lots of rules about who could:


- come into Aotearoa New Zealand
- leave Aotearoa New Zealand.





#### **Managed Isolation and**

Quarantine / MIQ was when people who came into the country were kept away from everyone else for a short time.




This was to check if they were sick with COVID-19 so the virus would not spread through the country.



The Royal Commission also looked at:



the health system






- social impacts
- vaccines
- mandates.

#### Here social impacts means:

- how people felt during the pandemic
- what people were able to do during the pandemic.



A **vaccine** is a medicine that can help stop you from getting very sick.











Here **mandates** mean rules the Government made about what people could do at different times during the pandemic.

This was so people could keep safe from COVID-19.

#### This included rules like:

- having to be vaccinated for some things like doing your job
- getting tested for COVID-19
- contact tracing which means listing:
  - o where you have been
  - the people you have spent time with
- wearing a mask.

# How did Aotearoa New Zealand do during the pandemic?



Aotearoa New Zealand did better than other countries at:

- protecting people from COVID-19
- keeping normal life going for as long as possible.




#### Aotearoa New Zealand also had:

fewer deaths from COVID-19



- less time in lockdown
- fewer people without jobs



 fewer days that learners / students missed school.



These things were a success because everyone worked:

- hard
- quickly.



Our response was not perfect because we were not as ready as we should have been for a pandemic.

# Being prepared and making good decisions



The Government did well at the start of the pandemic.




People in Government worked very hard to respond quickly to COVID-19.



Aotearoa New Zealand was not ready for how big the pandemic got.



We changed how we did things to keep up with what was going on.



The Royal Commission found the Government needed to be better prepared to support the country as the pandemic kept going.



The Royal Commission found the Government needed to work more with:

- businesses
- iwi / Māori tribes
- communities.



#### Lockdowns



The Royal Commission found lockdowns kept COVID-19 from being spread at the start of the pandemic.



The Royal Commission found lockdowns were hard:


- to put in place / make happen
- to keep going well



on some people more than others.







- iwi / Māori tribes
- community groups.



The Royal Commission said a way to have fewer lockdowns if another pandemic happens is to support public health with more:



- money
- people to do the work.

### Closing the borders



The Royal Commission found that closing the borders kept COVID-19 out of Aotearoa New Zealand.



The Royal Commission says setting up Managed Isolation and Quarantine / MIQ so fast was a big achievement.




The Royal Commission found closing the borders was very hard on some people.




The Royal Commission found there were many problems with MIQ like not having enough rooms for everyone who wanted to travel to Aotearoa New Zealand.

# Healthcare in the pandemic



The Royal Commission found the Aotearoa New Zealand healthcare system was not ready for a pandemic.



The pandemic was a very difficult time for healthcare:

- workers
- providers.



What the Government did during the pandemic was good at stopping the healthcare system from being **overwhelmed**.




#### Here overwhelmed means:

- too many people are using something all at once
- there is not enough for everyone.



There were big problems like people could not:

- visit their loved ones in hospital
- get their usual healthcare.



The Royal Commission found that problems in the healthcare system were made worse by the pandemic.


# Social and economic changes



The Royal Commission found that during the pandemic the Government had given good:



 social support that made sure people were looked after






- o businesses could still run
- most people had enough money to live.



The pandemic made some things in Aotearoa New Zealand worse like:






 economic problems like businesses not being able to run properly.



The Royal Commission found that the pandemic was worse for some people than for others.



The Royal Commission found that:

- the COVID-19 pandemic is not over for many people
- people still need support.



#### **Vaccination**



The Royal Commission found that getting a vaccine for Aotearoa New Zealand was done the right way.



Getting the vaccine to everyone:

- was hard
- went mostly well.




The Royal Commission found it took too long to get the vaccine to:

- Māori
- Pacific people.





The Royal Commission found that getting people vaccinated:





 stopped more than 45 thousand people having to go to hospital when sick.



It was a big job to get the vaccine out to everyone in Aotearoa New Zealand.



Most people had 2 doses of the vaccine by the end of 2021.



#### Some people:

- were not sure about getting vaccinated
- found it hard to get the vaccine
- did not want the vaccine.

#### **Mandates**




During different parts of the pandemic the Government said people must:



• get tested for COVID-19

do contact tracing / say if they

went to a place where there were





 get vaccinated for things like doing their job.



The Royal Commission found that mandates made some people very unhappy with the Government.



The Royal Commission found that mandates:

• were a good thing to do


but

 could be done better if another pandemic happens.



The Royal Commission found that it upset a lot of people when some vaccine mandates were used:

in too many places



• for too long.

# What did people tell the Royal Commission?



The Royal Commission thanks everyone who shared what happened to them doing the COVID-19 pandemic.



People told the Royal Commission:

- Aotearoa New Zealand did well at the start of the pandemic
- many people became unhappy as the pandemic kept going.







 Aotearoa New Zealand needed to be better prepared for the pandemic

and

 the whole Government needed to work together.





The Royal Commission heard that:

- people did not agree on whether lockdowns were a good thing
- lockdowns could have easier rules to follow
- lockdowns should only be used when it is very important.











#### People told the Royal Commission:

- the borders of the country should have been closed sooner
- MIQ should have:
  - been more fair
  - had better rules 0
- people should have been able to isolate / do quarantine at home.

The Royal Commission heard that the Government needs to put more money into the healthcare system.




The Royal Commission heard that people:

 in general felt supported during the difficult times of the pandemic

but



- still felt the impacts like:
  - prices going up like food costing more







The Royal Commission heard that:

 people were happy that vaccines were available

but



 getting vaccines to everyone could have been done quicker.



Some people said they did not have enough information to give **informed consent** for the vaccine.



**Consent** is when you agree to do something.

It is your choice to give consent.



**Informed consent** is when you have the information you need to make your choice.



People could not agree if mandates:

- were a good thing
- should be used again if another pandemic happens.

# **Getting ready for the future**



The Royal Commission says we need to make sure everyone can work together during a pandemic including:



- the Government
- communities around the country.



The Royal Commission has made recommendations to the Government so they will be ready if another pandemic happens.



A **recommendation** is an idea that would be a good thing to do.



The Royal Commission recommends the Government makes a pandemic plan where all agencies work together.



The Royal Commission recommends all parts of the country are ready for a pandemic including:



health



social



economic




- education like schools
- justice like:
  - the police 0
  - courts. 0



The Royal Commission recommends the Government sets up a group to organise everyone in Government to get ready for pandemics in the future.



The Royal Commission recommends that in a future pandemic response the Government should:





 work closely with communities in Aotearoa New Zealand.




The Royal Commission recommends the Government use experts to support their pandemic:

- planning
- response.









- protect human rights / the things everyone should be able to do
- focus on outcomes that will happen over a long time.



Outcomes are how things end up for people.

Here an outcome could be everyone having access to vaccines.






The Royal Commission recommends that if a pandemic happens in the future the Government:

- listens to concerns from everyone
- is clear about its decisions.
